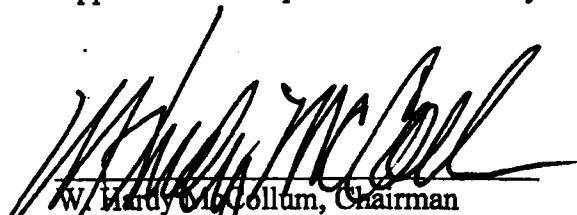
WHEREAS, a Public Hearing has been held to inform the public and receive input regarding the proposed change in location and no negative comments were or have been received by the County; and

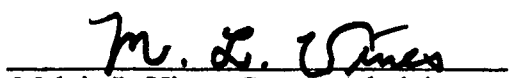

**Project Narrative: Goals and Objectives**

The Kentuck Museum Association requests a gift of \$150,000.00 from the Tuscaloosa County Commission to assist with critically needed renovations of and improvements to the Kentuck Museum building. Uninhabitable since the spring of 2013, the Museum is the cornerstone of the Kentuck campus and a valuable resource to regional and national artists as well as thousands of students and families throughout West Alabama. County funding will support a project of significant impact on local, regional and statewide communities, a project that is essential to Kentuck's ability to achieve its mission.

Tuscaloosa County has earned national recognition as home to one of America's premier arts festivals, which supports a year-round calendar of grassroots programming. Annually, the Kentuck Festival of the Arts attracts more than 15,000 individuals from Alabama and beyond who gather to experience and appreciate the work of hundreds of artists and craftspeople. Cited by *American Style Magazine* as one of the country's top ten fairs and festivals, the Kentuck Festival is a place where both established and aspiring artists from diverse backgrounds come together to create, celebrate and sell their work. What began in 1971 as a shoestring event featuring 20 artists and craftsmen on Main Avenue now attracts upwards of 260 artists—painters, sculptors, photographers, quilters, woodworkers and others—who vie for selection on the highly competitive Kentuck Festival roster.

As a juried, curatorial event with a history of showcasing rural and ethnically diverse artists, the Festival is aligned with other projects the Tuscaloosa County Commission has supported in perpetuating the arts and culture in the West Alabama area. Alabama artists Jimmie Lee Sudduth and Mose Tolliver, whose work has been featured in the Smithsonian, the High Museum of Art, and many other collections, were among the Festival's first featured artists. Craig Nutt, Woodie Long, Charlie Lucas and many others are members of the family of Kentuck artists whose work has gained broader appreciation in part through their participation in the Festival.

Kentuck also gives Alabamians the opportunity to create art, which is a new experience for many of our visitors. "Kentuck for Kids" keeps children engaged with an array of hands-on activities, while the University of Alabama's Book Arts Program teaches visitors to make paper from bark, cotton rags, and even mule dung, and the Sloss Furnace team sends Festival-goers home with hand-forged metal sculptures.

While the Festival is central to Kentuck's purpose of bringing together extraordinary artists and craftspeople and preserving Southern folk traditions, the Kentuck Art Center has a year-round mission to perpetuate the arts, engage the community and empower the artist. The Center provides working artists with studios nestled around a landscaped "Courtyard of Wonders." The Clay Co-op gives potters of all skill levels a

place to work in community with others who share their interests. The adjacent Georgine Clarke Building houses additional artist studios, expanded exhibition space and a large gathering space for community events and arts education.

The heart of operations for the Kentuck Art Center, the Kentuck Museum is the main building on the art center's campus. Built in the 1930s, the Museum is a two-story concrete and wooden structure housing the main gallery for monthly exhibitions, the Kentuck Gallery Shop, and administrative offices on its first floor. The second floor, with inadequate heating and cooling systems, has been used largely for storage since its deterioration made it impossible to be used by artists.

***Project Narrative: Need***

In March of 2013, a catastrophic bat infestation inside the Museum Building forced an immediate evacuation from the main building into the Clarke Building, which Kentuck had been using for studio spaces and community events. Experts were brought in to remove the bats and their roosts, a labor-intensive process that took nearly three months. When ceilings, duct work and interior walls were torn down to eradicate the bats, the extent of the building's structural flaws became instantly apparent. An engineering firm, Almon & Associates, Inc., was retained and their report outlined significant structural problems, which require a major overhaul of the Museum's second story support and roof structures. In addition, windows need replacing and basic electrical and plumbing systems must be brought up to code.

In the following weeks, the Board of the Museum Association reviewed the options for restoring functionality to the Museum. The Board retained Ellis Architects to review the engineering report, work with staff to develop a space plan, and make recommendations for the renovation of the building. In October, Ellis presented their initial findings to the Board and in November the firm submitted final conceptual drawings. The Board subsequently approved Ellis's recommendations and authorized the formation of a Strategic Fundraising Planning Committee with a goal of \$1+ million to support Ellis's proposed plan.

The Kentuck construction project will incorporate a complete renovation of the Museum, making both floors useable by artists, staff and community members, while retaining the character and tradition that are hallmarks of the Kentuck Art Center. The first floor will include expanded exhibition space for artists and an improved floor plan for the Kentuck Gallery Shop. The second floor will house staff offices and a classroom/meeting space. The renovation will achieve a Museum that provides two stories of exhibition and work space, and will allow the Clarke building to return to its primary purpose—providing studios for artists and badly-needed event space for the community.

The Museum is a linchpin in the economic redevelopment and stability of one of this community's historic districts. Listed in the National Register of Historic Places, downtown Northport was settled in the early 19th century. Brick streets, ornate lighting, landscaping, and other amenities make the area picturesque and an attraction for residents and visitors alike. The Kentuck campus is harmonious with its surrounding structures and the renovation will preserve the Museum's current exterior aesthetic.

Kentuck is very excited to see the completion of the Alberta School of Performing Arts and the educational art venues for our youth. Art educational spaces for our adults and cultural tourism are two of our goals at Kentuck to carry through with the cultural

experiences to which our youth will now be exposed. By adding a classroom and more functional studio spaces, Kentuck will provide multiple venues for instruction as well as additional spaces for mounting and viewing exhibitions. Enhancing Kentuck as a destination for visitors and visiting student groups provides another means of fulfilling our mission to perpetuate the arts and engage the community. The repair and restoration of the Kentuck campus also has positive implications for the continued viability of this historic and art district, in accordance with the Tuscaloosa County Commission's goal of supporting projects that make permanent, enduring improvements in our community. The preservation and rejuvenation of one of the area's longest-lived arts enterprises will continue and expand Kentuck's role as an economic engine for West Alabama and the state.

The renovation of the Museum is key to Kentuck's future and its ability to support appreciation for multi-cultural artistic expression and arts education. Over the last four years, the Association's Board of Directors has made significant progress in securing a talented professional staff and working with them to improve the fiscal profile of the organization. The Board has strengthened its own ranks and is confident in its plans to secure the funds necessary to complete the project. With a capable staff, a committed Board, and a fully functioning Museum, Kentuck will continue to move forward in its goal to bring art to community and build community with art.

***Project Narrative: Implementation Plan—Design and Construction***

Ellis Architects is overseeing the design and construction administration of the project. Brian Brooker is Senior Project Architect, assisted by Project Architect William Sims and Interior Designer Yolanda Crawford. Harrison Construction has been awarded the project through a competitive bidding process. Ellis will monitor and administer the project throughout the construction phase until final occupancy.

***Project Narrative: Implementation Plan—Fundraising***

With a project goal of \$1+ million, Kentuck has assembled a team of board and staff members and community volunteers to lead the fundraising effort. The Strategic Fundraising Planning Committee is comprised of:

- David Pass, Planning Committee chairman, Kentuck Board Member and Partner, Sealy Real Estate
- Lucy Arnold Sikes, Past President of the Board and Director of the President's Cabinet, University of Alabama
- Elizabeth Brock, President of the Board and Director of the Center for Public Television and Radio
- Sontonia Stephens, Vice President and Director of Supportive Services, Community Service Programs of West Alabama
- Pam Parker, Consultant, Philanthropic Partners, LLC and Former Vice President for Advancement, University of Alabama
- Kellee Reinhart, Vice Chancellor, The University of Alabama System
- Amy Echols, Executive Director, Kentuck Art Center
- Mike Echols, CPA, Michael H. Echols & Associates, PC

The Planning Committee conducted a rigorous feasibility study to determine how Kentuck was viewed by potential donors and to gauge the prospects of securing financial resources sufficient to reach the campaign goal. Under the leadership of Pam Parker and David Pass, the group reviewed Kentuck's history of giving and community

support, interviewed current and past Board members, corporate, civic and philanthropic leaders, and municipal and county officials. Encouraged by the positive response, the Committee secured the approval of the full Board to launch the capital campaign.

Over the past several months, the Planning Committee has recruited a Campaign Steering Committee currently comprised of:

- David Pass, Steering Committee Chairman, Kentuck Board Member and Partner, Sealy Real Estate
- Sam Faucett III, retired Chairman of the Board and CEO of Regions Bank and prominent philanthropist and community volunteer
- Jim Harrison III, owner and director of Harrison Galleries LLC., member of many cultural, civic and charitable boards
- Becky Booker, Kentuck Board Member and Public Relations & Marketing Manager of Tuscaloosa County Park and Recreation
- Lewis and Carrie Fitts, Community Leaders
- Karen Burklew, Alabama Power Company

In the silent phase of the campaign, the Committee has secured \$706,000 in pledges, including 100% participation from the Kentuck Board of Directors. Major pledges are outlined below:

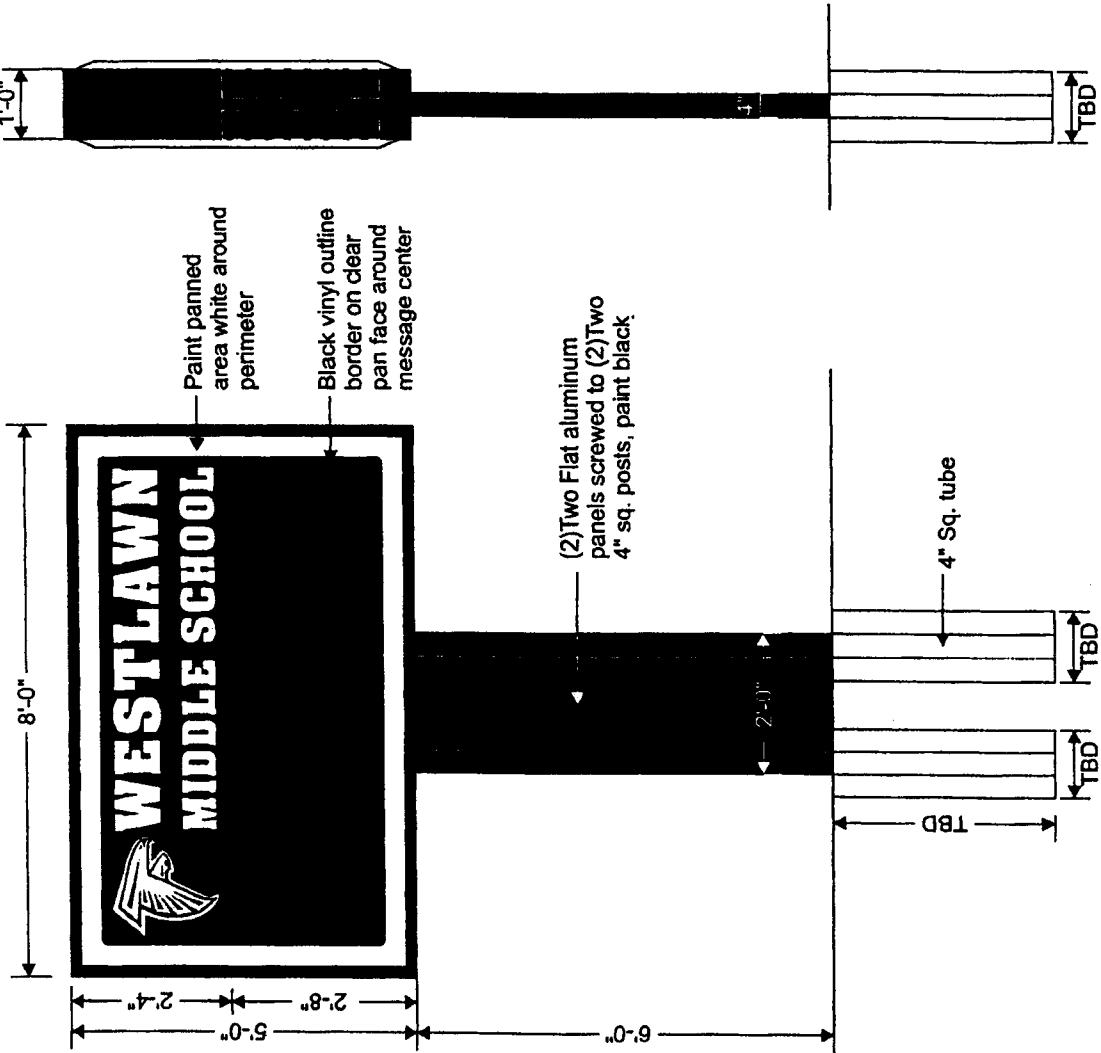
